PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Parents and Carers

Term 2

Thank you for your support of your children and our school throughout term 2. It has been a fast and furious term that started with our Coolamatong Camp, including Naplan testing, winter sports and cross country and finished in a flurry with Prep information sessions and open classrooms.

I wish to thank teachers and support staff for their ongoing relentless passion to help students learn both academically and socially throughout the term.

We look forward to commencing next term on Monday 10th July (Staff only) and Tuesday 11th July for all students.

Half-Yearly Reports

The half yearly reports have been sent home this week. We would like to draw attention to the learning growth that appears on the graphs for all students from Years 1 and above. This growth indicates the progress that students have made over a 12 month period. Whilst some children show growth at different rates and times, the aim is to have 12 months growth for every 12 months at school. Some areas may be lower in areas of growth due to topics not yet covered in the first semester of school.

The shaded band indicates the "expected" achievement levels, however, even if your child is below this bar their academic growth is still a cause for celebration. Remember there is still another 6 months of learning to be done this year.

The 5 point A-E scale is a requirement of the Department. It should be interpreted as follows:

A = Well above expected level (Learning achievement is high and extension is in place)

B= Above expected level (some extension opportunities will be provided)

C= At Expected Level (*C is at level so "C" is for celebration*)

D= Below expected level (some small elements of learning may be needed for growth)

E=Well below expected level (Intervention will be occurring at this level)

If you have any questions in relation to your child's report, please speak with your child's teacher.

Well that's it for term two 2023. What a great term it's been. I have few highlights to share.




Championship UNO has been a winner for getting to know the kids. I'll take a few kids at a time and we play a full on version of the classic card game UNO. There are


Another highlight for me this term has been getting to know more parents. Whether in person or over the phone it has been great connecting with, encouraging and being encouraged by you. I

Please do not give any medication to students to keep in their bag.


New in the Library!
