What is NAIDOC WEEK? NAIDOC Week is an opportunity for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth.

This year, we celebrated NAIDOC Week with a visit from The Australian Ballet. They presented a ballet created and choregraphed by First Nation artists. It tells the Dreamtime story of Pomi and Gobba, frogs that live on opposite sides of the Murrumbidgee River. Pomi and Gobba learn to work together and realise that they are stronger together.

Each class also had the opportunity to be taught by the dancers during Performing Arts sessions. Students learnt the importance of warming up and good posture in dance and also



some amazing ballet moves including pirouettes and jetes.

you don't have to shout.


What if James hadn't snuck inside the giant peach?

Or Jack and Jill hadn't gone up that hill?


Some stories can have a different ending if we remember to be a little bit naughty!





A better way to dispose of your unwanted clothing!

Pre-loved unwanted items of clothing can now be recycled thanks to free textile disposal chutes at Lardner and Trafalgar transfer stations.

The service enhancement, delivered by Baw Baw Shire Council in partnership with Upcylce4Better, means that residents now have the options to recycle acceptable textile items that are unable to be recycled as part of standard kerbside collection, at no additional cost.

In 2022, textiles made up for approximately 7% of Baw Baw Shire's red garbage bin waste. With the introduction of this sustainable textile recycling program, these previously unrecyclable items can be diverted from ending up in landfill and instead recovered and repurposed for future use.

"Reducing what ends up in landfill is one of the most impactful actions we can take to help protect our environment," says Mayor of Baw Baw Shire Cr Annemarie McCabe. "As a Council we want to do everything we can to make it as easy as possible to reduce landfill waste. We are so pleased to take this step and offer our residents the opportunity to recycle their unwanted clothing and fabric at no additional cost," says Mayor McCabe.

"The positive results we saw recently as part of kerbside collection audits is a testament to our residents who continue to do a fantastic job at recycling. I have no doubt our community will take up this program and support any opportunity to create a more sustainable future for Baw Baw."

Acceptable textiles include items of clothing, shoes, underwear, hats, belts, handbags, backpacks, bed linen, towels and soft toys.

Items not accepted include hospital overalls, hotel slippers, face masks and mattresses.

Residents are asked to please note that textile items must be dry when placed into the chute. Any items that are wet or damp cannot be accepted.
